The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2022.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of Dundalk Simon Community present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2022.

The charity is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

Mission, Objectives and Strategy

Mission Statement

Vision:

Our vision is a community where everyone lives in a place they call home.

The Mission statement of the organisation is working with others to develop solutions to homelessness by:

- Developing services to prevent people from becoming homeless
- Providing emergency accommodation for people who become homeless
- Supporting people to achieve a home of their own
- Supporting people to keep their homes
- Advocating for changes in social policy that will make a real impact on ending homelessness

Objectives

Provide housing and support services to all stages of homelessness and enable people to move to a place they can call home. We strive to empower people to access, secure and retain a home of their own by reducing the reliance on short-term accommodation and providing permanent supported housing for people to sustain a home in their local community. Moving people in to supported housing or independent housing produces life-enhancing and life-saving results and is more cost-effective in the long run.

Strategy

The strategy of the company also includes the development of additional supported housing in the North East, the development of Simon Community's work and presence in Cavan & Monaghan and an increase in its advocacy and campaigning work to help influence changes in policy and practice at local, regional and national level that will benefit all people who are homeless.

The company is satisfied that it has the adequate resources to maintain and increase its current level of service in the coming year.

Structure, Governance and Management

Structure

Dundalk Simon Community is a charitable company limited by guarantee, and not having a share capital, incorporated in the Republic of Ireland under the Companies Acts 2014. The company does not have a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets or liabilities of the company on winding up such amounts as may be required not exceeding one Euro (€1).

Dundalk Simon Community is governed by an elected board of Directors, as per its Constitution, who are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At year end the board have four members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association and managed by a Board of Directors. The company has been granted charitable status under section 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997.

The Board operate to the legal requirements as set out in the Companies and Charities Act as well as the necessary governance requirements and standards as laid out under the Charity Regulator and Approved Housing Regulator Authority.

The Board is committed to achieving high standards of governance. Board members do not receive any remuneration or expenses in respect of their services to the company. There have been no contracts, or arrangements entered into, during the financial year ion which a board member was materially interested or which were significant in relation to the company activities.

The directors do not hold any beneficial interest in the company.

Dundalk Simon Community believes in and has a continuing commitment to voluntarism because of the added value with which volunteers bring to the charity through their dedication and work. Volunteers contribute greatly to the success of the Simon Shop, charity events and tenancy sustainment.

It is impossible to quantify the hours generously given by the public in response to various fund-raising efforts. Without the help from our volunteers we would not be able to offer our current levels of support during a period of ever increasing demand.

All members of the board of Directors volunteer their experience, expertise and time to the benefit of Dundalk Simon Community and its continued development.

Dundalk Simon Community is one of eight Simon Communities operating in the Republic of Ireland, the others being in Cork, Galway, Dublin, Mid West, Midlands, North West & South East. All the communities, together with the Simon National Office, comprise the national body, The Simon Communities of Ireland.

Governance and Board Developments

Since 2018 the Board of Dundalk Simon Community had in place a Management arrangement (MOU) with Dublin Simon Community, where Dublin Simon Community assumed management responsibility for Service Level Agreements and support functions for Dundalk Simon Community. The MOU lasted until 2022 with a change of Dundalk Simon Community Constitution.

After consultation with the Charity Regulator, Approved Housing Body Regulatory Authority and legal advice both Boards agreed to adopt a new Dundalk Simon Constitution where Dublin Simon Community is entitled to nominate a majority of members to the Board of Directors of Dundalk Simon Community. This was approved as at EGM in March 2022 and a new Constitution was approved and field with the CRO. Day to day operations of Dundalk Simon is undertaken by the Dublin Simon Community CEO and Executive Management Team who oversee delivery including SLAs, standards, processes, policies, procedures, and practices.

Board of Directors of Dundalk Simon remain the trustees of the organisation and responsible for its legal standing and major decision-making including purchase and disposal of its assets etc. The Board continues to fulfil legal statutory obligations under Companies Act 2019 and Charities Act 2014. Services remain operational as per service level agreements, Charity and Company status of Dundalk Simon Community remains. The Board are conscious and appreciative of the support of the local community to its local charity and are committed to its entity in Dundalk and Louth serving and supporting the local homeless community.

for the financial year ended 31 December 2022

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

Charitable Services:

Dundalk Simon Community offer a range of options to people who are homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless:

- The Gatehouse Project offers accommodation every night for up to ten people who otherwise would be sleeping on the street. It is open 24 hours per day and provides a bed, warmth, a meal and general support.
- The Community House offers accommodation for up to 23 people at any one time supporting them to regain control of their own lives and futures.
- The Castle Road Project offers accommodation for 4 people at any one time supporting them to regain control of their own lives and futures.
- Seatown House is the base for administration services and our day centre service. It acts as a focal point for former residents, and for people who are living in the Community House, The Gatehouse Project etc. It also offers meals, counselling and employment skills onsite.
- The charity offers 7 long term houses together with 7 transitional housing units for a total of 18 individuals. This comprises of 16 units in Dundalk and 2 units in Drogheda, Co Louth,
- The Simon Community Shop is based in Yorke Street. It is staffed by people on supportive employment schemes and volunteers and is yet another focal point of their work in Dundalk.
- Our day centre in Seatown House was closed from 16th March 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions and reopened in August 2022.

Overall in 2022, 98 unique individuals accessed our emergency beds in Barrack Street. This comprised of 1 bed sponsored by Monaghan County Council, 2 beds sponsored by Cavan County Council and 27 beds sponsored by Louth County Council.

It was calculated that approximately 23% of these individuals were female and 77% being male.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 14 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of €4,119,560 (2021 - €4,685,628) and liabilities of €914,908 (2021 - €886,744). The net assets of the charity have decreased by €(594,232).

for the financial year ended 31 December 2022

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties the charity face relate to the risk of a decrease in the level of funding and the potential increase in compliance requirements in accordance with company law, health and safety, taxation and other legislation.

The charity mitigates these risks as follows:

- The charity continually monitors the level of activity, prepares and monitors its budget, target and projections.
- The charity is committed to establishing adequate cash reserves, which in the opinion of the board, represents three months operation expenditure. It has also developed plans which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities.
- The charity closely monitors emerging changes to regulations and legislation on an ongoing basis.

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with Health & Safety to staff, volunteers, clients and visitors to the centre.

The company has minimal currency risk and credit risk.

The directors are aware of the key risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operating and finances of the company and are satisfied that there are appropriate systems in place to mitigate these risks as appropriate.

Dundalk Simon Community is committed to effectively managing its risk on a formal basis to support better decision making based on a clear understanding of risks and their likely impact. A framework is in place, consisting of a series of well defined steps to support ongoing risk management, and to raise awareness of risk and the need to manage it consistently and effectively across all levels of the organisations Risk Management Policy.

Our Future Plans

Dundalk Simon Community will continue to advocate and provide services for people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. The directors plan to build on the solid foundations laid to date by continuing to develop services to meet identified needs, utilising its location and expertise.

The key priorities are as follows:

- Improve stakeholder relationships for the enhancement of support services within the community, particularly in the areas of mental health terms, addiction services and move on options.
 - Building on the success of high rate of move ones from emergency accommodation, we will continue to support our clients to secure long term accommodation and repatriate with their families.
 - New management restructure added to existing services in Dundalk
 - Intention that clients will have access to treatment services, client development services and counselling services through Simon Community partnerships
 - In liaison with HSE, develop support of a primary care nurse who will provide in-reach services to our clients in Barrack Street.
 - Staff development and training in Trauma Informed Care and motivational interviewing and Mental Health.
 - Working with UCD on Public Patient Involvement (PPI) research Project to review clients experience of Castle Rd 4 bed STA.
 - Introducing new pilot 'quality of life' measurement tool to clients.
 - Introduce bi-monthly housing needs review with local authority in order to review clients housing needs.
 - Always improving standards and have introduced a quarterly audit review for all services in Dundalk including Health & Safety audit by year end 2023, and a National Quality Standard Framework audit with the Louth County Council.
 - Secure statutory funding for Seatown House and the three independent Bungalows in Barrack Street.
 - The board of directors have approved the redevelopment of a green field site at the front of the Barrack Street service. The intention is to develop the site as social housing to meet the growing needs of the homeless people of Dundalk and surrounding areas.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the charity financial statements of Dundalk Simon Community for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating an Income and Expenditure Account), the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Dundalk Simon Community is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the company is Seatown House, Seatown Place, Dundalk, Co. Louth which is also the principal place of business of the charity. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the charity.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)".

The charity has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)" and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Income

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the charity. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the charity is meeting the core objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income.
- -Time based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the charity recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the charity is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

Expenditure

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundraising activities. Non-staff costs attributed to one category of activity are allocated or appointed pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR, IT and administravtive staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Freehold properties are stated at cost (or deemed cost for freehold premises held at valuation date of transition to FRS102) less accumulated depreciation. Under the instructions of the directors, freeholds are valued on the basis of open market value as valued by McGahon Surveyors in 2014. Properties obtained under the Capital Assistance Scheme (CAS) are also included in the Fixed Assets Register. These Properties are recognised under long term liabilities over a fixed term of years and are being depreciated over the term of the CAS Mortgage.

Cost included prime cost, overheads and interest incurred in financing the construction of tangible fixed assets. Capitalisation of interest ceases when the assets is brought into use.

Th company undertakes a review for impairment of a fixed asset if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the fixed assets may not be recoverable. Revaluation losses are recognised in the statement of total recognised gains and losses until the carrying amount reaches its depreciated historical cost and thereafter in the statement of financial activities. An exception is where the recoverable amount of the asset is greater than its revalued amount. In the case of a loss, is recognised in the statement of total recognised gains & losses to the extent that the recoverable amount is greater than its revalued amount

Depreciation is calculated in order to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful life as follows:

2% Straight line 3.33% Straight line

The Company's policy is to review the remaining useful economic lives and residual values of property, plant & equipment and fixtures & fittings on an on-going basis and to adjust the depreciation charge to reflect the remaining estimated useful life and residual value.

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the cost of the asset and related accumulated depreciation until they are removed from service. In the case of disposals, assets and related depreciation are removed from the financial statements and the net amount, less proceeds from disposal, is charged or credited to the income and expenditure account

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

GOING CONCERN 3.

The Charity is substantially dependent on discretionary income to cover its operating expenses and to meet its objectives as stated in the directors report. Such income normally takes the form of grants, general fndraising receipts and other funding. The directors believe that income will continue at an adequate level for the foreseeable future so that the charity can continue in operational existence. In these circumstances the financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis.

Loans under Capital Assistance Schemes are received by the Community from the local authority, Louth County Council, by way of a mortgage, and are repayable over 30 years.

Louth County Council has a charge over the Community's properties as security for the finance received. Under the terms of the mortgage, the Community is relieved of monthly capital and interest repayments so long as the community is in compliance with the specific conditions set out in the relevant mortgage agreement, primarily with respect to the use and upkeep of the related properties.

Under the terms of the Capital Assistance Schemes the amount repayable to the local authority as at balance sheet date of €671,034 represent the aggregate finance received to date amounting to €1,322,348 as reduced by the cumulative repayments relieved to date of €651,314.

12. STATUS

The charity is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

The liability of the members is limited.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of its being wound up while they are members, or within one financial year thereafter, for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the company contracted before they ceased to be members, and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves, such amount as may be required, not exceeding € 1.
